It would be remiss of me not to also sincerely thank our distinguished Australian speakers: Dr Kevin Donnelly, Dr David Daintree and Dr Paul Morrissey.

Throughout the two days Australians were refreshed and nourished with what education is really all about. The words truth, goodness and beauty were repeatedly mentioned as we explored classical education. Our hearts were set on fire as our current perceptions of education were challenged. As ACES moves forwards, I would like to invite each one of you to consider joining one or more of our focus groups for 2022. These are as follows:

- 1) Classical Education Reading Group: The objective of this group is to read books that have been written about classical education such as Norms and Nobility, Poetic Knowledge and The Liberal Arts Tradition: A Philosophy of Christian Classical Education, just to name a few. All participants would read the same book and meet once a month online using the Zoom platform. The reading group would be led by a mentor who would lead the discussion. All members of this group would be required to read certain chapters from the same book each month. Books selected would be purchased by each participant at their own cost. The tentative dates are every Thursday evenings from 7pm to 8.30pm, beginning on Thursday July 7 and running for 4 to 6 weeks.
- 2) Curriculum Writing Group: The objective of this group is to create units of work that align the classical education framework with Australian Curriculum standards. These units of work will then be stored and shared to schools that are transitioning to a classical model or presented to government and educational representatives. Examples of aligning the classical education approach include the University of Dallas K-12 Curriculum Project.
- 3) Social Media and Marketing Group: The objective of the Marketing and Social Media focus group will involve becoming familiar with using social media platforms and online tools to generate interest in classical education and the mission of ACES. We anticipate that these platforms will engage new members across social media, digital and print media, newsletters and other marketing outlets. The role is very much about communicating externally and building relationships with potential and current constituents and raising awareness.
- 4) Research into Classical Education Group: The objective of this group is to research existing classical education school models both overseas and in Australia, e.g. charter school models, as well as create reports that will be shown to any existing schools seeking to transition to becoming a liberal arts or classical school. It would include researching school policies that are required in classical schools and issues concerning governance and administration in classical schools.


### SCHOOLS MUST RETURN TO A CLASSICAL EDUCATION
