President's Report

Dear friends and subscribers.

First of all, I hope that this email finds each one of you well. In the last few weeks more Australians have emailed ACES seeking information about its mission and its goals. I will begin answering this question in this edition and over the next few editions.



One of the goals of ACES is to establish classical schools in every state and territory in Australia. In order for this to occur, teachers and parents particularly need to be convinced why this is the type of education that their child deserves to receive. Thus, ACES seeks to establish regional networks in each capital city i.e. a Melbourne network group, Sydney network group etc. These state-based network groups will comprise local teachers and parents who wish to learn more about classical schools and eventually create these schools. These network groups when established will organise events in their states, such as, parent information evenings, conferences, teacher training professional development days, and book clubs. Each state and territory will begin with a core group and slowly grow in numbers. ACES will support each group by promoting any events via our website and social media.

During the month of May, a Melbourne network group meeting occurred for the very first time. I'm hoping that a network group meeting can happen online in the next few months in Sydney, Brisbane, Adelaide, and Perth. ACES ideally wishes to create new brick and mortar classical schools over the next few decades. However, we also realise that there are already established schools that are wishing to transition to becoming liberal arts colleges. Thus, we are very keen to create and share resources with college principals who are interested in their school becoming classical. These resources will include units of work, college policies, and pedagogical tools that are all concerned with classical education, and aligned as closely as possible to particular curriculum and ACARA guidelines. The degree of flexibility varies in each state and territory and ACES will seek to support such initiatives.

One other goal of ACES is to offer professional development to teachers who aspire to work in a classical school. In order for this to occur teachers in Australia first need to be trained in the fundamentals of classical education. These teachers will then train other teachers or act as mentors. Let's be honest, the majority of us have not been classically trained! I'm hoping to approach the leaders in the classical school renewal in America (like CiRCE) to consider organising and running professional live training sessions at appropriate times for Australians. Initially, we need to learn from the Americans who are well-established in classical education and offer many courses for teachers. Once a core group of teachers in Australia have been trained then we can expand on this.

A third goal of ACES is to create and offer a YouTube series of videos and podcasts where we can interview principals, teachers, parents who are involved in the classical school renewal here in Australia. These videos will seek to create further awareness about classical education along with this newsletter.

As you can see there is an enormous amount of work to be done and there are very few labourers. I'm certain that every person who receives and reads this newsletter has many talents and strengths that we at ACES are not even aware of. Whether it be writing a unit of work, producing a podcast, organising an information session for parents, writing an article for the newsletter, creating promotional brochures that can be distributed to parents, or having a casual chat with a teacher or principal, we would like to hear from you. We need you!

NEWS FROM HARTFORD COLLEGE




Parents continue to enquire about the unique educational approach at Hartford College. Watch the latest video with Principal, Frank Monagle, where he explains what makes Hartford College different.

Books of Interest


