


In this video Jonathan Pageau leads a discussion about music, archetypes versus fractals, and how we can look at beauty as something objective, like biology.

RECOMMENDED VIEWING

The Intersection of Music, Art and Culture

Why is it important for everyone to engage with art? Professor Carol Reynolds (professor of music history and global art educator with the Dallas Symphony and the Van Cliburn Foundation), discusses why art belongs as a foundational element of a classical education. Art, she says, is a reflection of what our culture values. And the study of playing music, art and craft, and even folk dance are ways we engage with and absorb art into our everyday lives. Books of Interest



In *Rethinking the Purpose of Education*, Jason Barney evaluates Bloom's taxonomy from within the broader purpose of education as articulated in the classical Christian education renewal movement. He proposes a Christian vision of moral, intellectual and spiritual virtues as the proper goals of education. Lastly, Barney articulates the value of Aristotle's five intellectual virtues as a rival paradigm for Bloom's taxonomy of cognitive domain objectives. The practical conclusion explores how to write learning objectives in a classical and Christian way.
