Welcome to the December edition of the ACES newsletter!

First of all, I would like to take this opportunity and thank each one of you for your ongoing support of ACES. During 2023, ACES was once again involved in many initiatives and projects. In conjunction with the CiRCE Institute we organised our second



annual online conference, "A Cultivation of Virtue", which included a few Australian speakers. We also continued offering professional development to teachers and parents by working with Adrienne Freas and her dedicated team at *Beautiful Teaching* in the USA. CHRISTOPER DAWSON SUMMER SCHOOL

From Monday 15 to Friday 19 January 2024, the Christopher Dawson Centre will host a summer school in Biblical Greek, held in Launceston or Hobart. The New Testament and Koine Greek school is for beginners who want to experience the excitement of reading parts of the Bible in the original language. Students shall read extracts from the Gospels and Epistles, as well as some important passages from the Septuagint (the ancient Greek version of the Old Testament), as well as some pieces from the early Fathers of the Church and the Liturgy of St John Chrysostom. HELLENIC MUSEUM SUMMER SCHOOL

The Hellenic Museum Summer School will offer four short courses in January exploring ancient Greek and Roman literature and society. One course will explore how the different tragedians present myths about Oedipus and his family. Another looks at how love and relationships are discussed in different genres. Other courses look at the life of Socrates and the cities of the Greek and Roman world.

The courses can be taken in person at Melbourne's heritage-listed Hellenic Museum or online. All courses will be presented by Dr Christopher Gribbin, an Adjunct Lecturer at La Trobe University, who has worked on educational products with the History Teachers' Association of Victoria and the ABC. The Summer School can be a valuable experience for teachers or anyone looking to engage with ancient literature and society.

ACTION, CONTEMPLATION AND THE LIBERAL ARTS




Why Beauty Matters with Dana Gioia
